

"DIE TRAPP-FAMILIE"

This is the story of the famous Family from Salzburg on which the now iconic Musical "The Sound of Music" was based. This is a film and not a musical, originally produced in black and while in 1956 but has since been colorized. It was produced by Wolfgang Reinhardt and starring famous actors like Ruth Leuwerik, Hans Holt, Josef Meinrad, Hilda Holst, Lisl Karstadt, and others. It was filmed in and around Salzburg and it is the authentic family history as remembered by Baroness Maria von Trapp and has none of the Hollywood embellishments that the Sound of Music contains. It does of course have some "Schmalz" but it's a different kind of "Schmalz" from that of Hollywood productions! We are certain that you will enjoy this piece of Austrian history!

As a "Vorspann" we found another one of Sepp Forcher's "Klingendes Österreich" which everyone enjoys so much. Sepp Forcher takes us to the "Donauberge" along a particular stretch of the Danube, itself one of Austria's national symbols and icons! The landscape is different from other "mountains" as we know them, their beauty lying in their individuality rather than the spectacular, but incomparable in their tranquility and timelessness.

Their loveliness invites us to rest and gaze down onto the big river valley and its views of pastures and orchards and vinyards. We visit Roman findings, Romanesque churches, and an authentically refurbished Celtic village dating back 2700 years, castles, fortresses, monasteries and convents in the Romanesque to the Baroque styles. As an example Forcher can fulfill one of his lifetime dreams of visiting Schloss Wallsee, which was acquired in the late 1800s by Duchess Marie Valerie, the youngest daughter of Emperor Franz Josef, and which is still in the private hands of the Habsburgs. All this is interspersed with folklore and music from local musical groups and marching bands in their colourful costumes.

Make sure you come early so that you may see this treasure from the very beginning, it is well worth it!

European Union Filmfest in Toronto

The Festival will take place from November 14 – 27, 2012, showings at Festival Cinema: The Ro9yal, 608 College Street, Toronto Free admission to all films on a first come, first serve basis For further information the link to their website is http://www.eutorontofilmfest.ca/

The Austrian contribution to this Film Festival is called "Die Vaterlosen", Predikat Wertvoll: Following the death of their father, four siblings reunite again after 20 years in their childhood home. Growing up in a small village in rural Austria, they seek their childhood roots and an emotional trip into the past begins. Through flashbacks it becomes clear that the siblings have very different recollections of their childhood and of growing up in a free-love commune. This duality between having to come to terms with the past while contemplating the future is demonstrated through intertwined timeframes. This award-winning film by Marie Kreutzer also asks the question "How much freedom can a child cope with?"
